Dear Parents, Carers and Children



✓ Check for pedestrians and cyclists before opening a car door

✓ Leave enough room on pavements for pedestrians, pushchairs & wheelchairs to get past

 $\checkmark\,$ Take care when reversing and do not use the school car park as a turning point

✓ DO NOT PARK ON ZIG ZAG LINES




Mrs S Roberts Bursar

It is now the Year of the Dragon. Each year is represented by one of twelve animals, and the allocation of these animals follow a cycle.

Lunar New Year is the beginning of a calendar which uses the phases of the Moon, called the lunisolar calendar.

To celebrate this new start, people spend time with their family and friends, share traditional food like noodles and dumplings, wear traditional clothing, and take part in Lion dancing.

The occasion typically includes fireworks and a bright lantern festival.

What?

Many people in China and Chinese communities across the world are currently celebrating Lunar New Year.

2024 marks the Year of the Dragon.

This year, the celebrations began on 10th February, and will continue for fifteen days. The dates of Lunar New Year vary as the festival is determined by the start of a new moon.
