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What will we be learning?

- Gain place knowledge of a small area of the United Kingdom.
- Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to key physical features and key human features.
- Explore and record features of our school grounds.

Key vocabulary

- Human features: something that is built by humans and would not have existed in nature e.g. houses, factories, farms, harbours, cities.
- **Physical features:** something that has happened naturally e.g. forests, cliffs, the sea.
- Landmarks: something that is easy to see (e.g. a building, large tree, statue) that is easy to see and can help a person find the way to a place near it.
- Aerial photos: photos that are taken from above with a camera mounted on an aircraft, balloon, drone or similar.
- Scale: a map scale is the size of an object compared to the size of the object's representation on a map.
- Map symbols: something that represents a real object or place on a map this could be words, letters or pictures.
- Key: a key on a map tells the reader what the symbols mean.
- United Kingdom: a country that includes England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.
- Rural: places or things in the countryside.
- Urban: places or things in a town or city.
- Land use: the way in which people use land.
- **Recreational:** an activity that is done for enjoyment.
