Key vocabulary

- Human features: something that is built by humans and would not have existed in nature e.g. houses, factories, farms, harbours, cities.
- **Physical features:** natural features of land e.g. forests, cliffs.
- Vegetation: plants, tress or flowers.
- Mountain: a very high area of land with steep sides.
- Land use: the way in which an area of land is used or the purpose for which it is used.
- Region: an area of a country that has common features.
- Settlement: the places people live.
- **Population:** the number of people that live in a country or area.
- Climate: the general weather of an area.

A compass is a magnetic instrument used for finding directions. The four directions on a compass are called cardinal directions. They are north, east, south and west. The needle within the compass will always point towards the north. It is made up of four smaller countries: England, Northerm Ireland, Scotland and Wales.

Each country has a **capital city**, as shown on this map.

England is split up into smaller sections called **regions**.

Each of these **regions** contains **counties**, **cities**, **towns** and **villages**.
